Collegiate athletic scholarships are not easy to come by, but several metro Atlanta college freshmen and sophomores went back to college with just that and more thanks to the efforts of TDC Systems Integration. Five golfers and graduates of the East Lake Foundation's First Tee Program were awarded full golf scholarships at various out-of-state colleges. Some of the college students started playing golf as young as age 7 when they enrolled in the East Lake program.

Friends of East Lake Foundation Board Member Tony Dozier is a mentor for four of the five students for the past two years. He stepped up and personally got involved recently to help them use their superior golf skills to get a college education. Realizing the young men needed help, Dozier made calls to colleagues and college administrators and orchestrated negotiations that led to golf scholarships, new laptop computers and financial donations for college books and supplies.

During business meetings with college officials Dozier learned of open athletic scholarships at Talladega College (TC) and initiated meetings with the school's golf coach. As a result of Dozier's efforts four golfers were accepted to TC this fall. But more help was needed.

All five students had other needs as well for items like laptops, school supplies and dorm room items. Dozier reached out to the Atlanta Workforce Development Agency (AWDA). As a result, on August 9, 2008, the students received \$250 gift cards, and new Dell laptop computers from the AWDA and Mayor Franklin as part of the Mayor's Youth Program initiatives.

Dozier believes supporting our youth and education is a commitment his company will continue in 2009 and beyond.

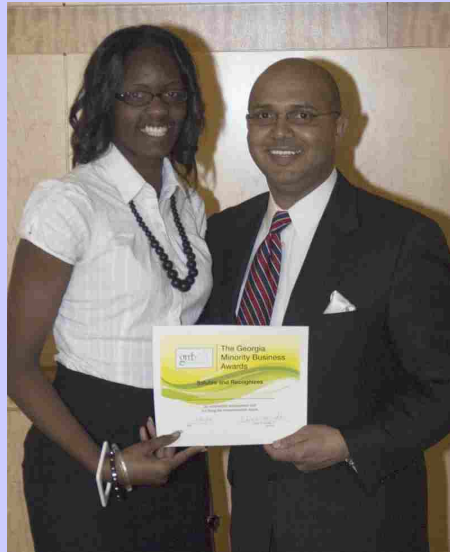
Dozier Escorts First Tee Junior Golfers to Tournament
